New Preserve Coming Soon! 1,566 acres along Lake Clementine and the North Fork of the American River

We are close to the finish line on protecting 1,566 acres of river canyon along Lake Clementine and the North Fork American River!

This soon-to-be preserved land is located between the communities of Applegate and Foresthill. Working in joint venture partnership with the Trust for Public Land (TPL), Placer Land Trust is purchasing the land and will transfer it to the U.S. Bureau of Land Management (BLM), ensuring that this land is held in the public trust and stays wild and scenic forever.

"Conservation along the American River has always been one of Placer Land Trust's top priorities," said Jeff Darlington, Placer Land Trust's Executive Director. "This river is the lifeblood of Placer County in many ways: it provides clean drinking water that is among the best on earth, it's the signature location where healthy outdoor recreation supports our local economy, and the river and forests provide a critical natural corridor for fish and wildlife."

On the Applegate side, the property, which is owned by private developers, was slated for the 97-lot "Kalorama" subdivision in the American River canyon. On the Foresthill side, the property contains stretches of the Upper and Lower Clementine Roads which access the two popular Lake Clementine access points: the boat launch area near the dam, and the Upper Lake Clementine Beach where the river meets the lake.

No new development will mean a big win for the health of our local environment.

Avoiding subdivision, development and fragmentation on both sides of the river and lake means local wildlife species get to stay wild, whether they are rare endemic species or the furry and fuzzy friends we see every day in Placer County. Mammals such as deer, amphibians such as the Foothill yellow-legged frog, and insects such as the Pipevine swallowtail butterfly, all thrive here.

Funding for the acquisition is being provided by a grant from the Land & Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), a federal program to safeguard natural areas, water



resources and cultural heritage across the country, and provide recreation opportunities to all. The LWCF funding mandates ownership and long-term management by BLM for conservation and recreation benefits. PLT also received project support from the Sierra Nevada Conservancy.

After BLM takes ownership and the agency has assessed the preserve, our local BLM field office can recommend new federal investment in forest health, fuels management, and the prevention of catastrophic wildfire. BLM also plans the creation of a new public trailhead on the Applegate side of the preserve, providing new recreational access from Interstate 80 to the river and Lake Clementine.

"BLM will manage the property similarly to the adjacent and popular Auburn State Recreation Area," said Jeff. "Specifically what this management will look like will be a process the public can weigh in on, but in the end there will probably be some prohibitions or limitations on activities such as camping, fires, and motorized recreation in order to protect the preserve, its wildlife, and its visitors ... and of course to protect our local communities from wildfire and other harmful impacts."

We hope to complete this project and share it with you very soon... stay tuned!

Placer Land Trust Receives Film Fest Award for "Gettin' Out with Gary"



Spring Fun and Citizen Science at Canyon View Preserve

We have some wonderful springtime opportunities to get out and enjoy our preserves on a guided hike (see the event calendar below), but if you'd like to explore some trails on your own, Canyon View Preserve is a great spot! Wildflower season is officially here, starting with early blooms like California poppies and buttercups. Fairy lanterns, brodiaea, and lupine won't be far behind.

While you're out at Canyon View, be sure to look for our new **Chronolog** station located at the hillside meadow! This is a cool way to participate in "citizen science" and help us document the changing view of the meadow with the seasons. Simply set your camera phone on the bracket, snap a photo, and follow the directions to add it to an online timelapse video. Scan the QR code at right, or visit **chronolog.io/site/PLT101**, to see what other visitors have documented so far.

The Canyon View Preserve trails are open to the public every day. A new interpretive trail, wildflower guides, benches, and the relaxing Gathering Space make this a great spot for all ages to enjoy. If you like, share your photos with us by tagging **@placerlandtrust** on social media!

Memorial Bench Honoring Larry Moore Installed at Aeolia Preserve

Larry and Becky Moore were married for 49 years, and spent much of their time together enjoying the outdoors. They both felt that a beautiful place to sit in nature would be a wonderful way to be remembered.

After Larry passed away in 2021, Becky contacted Placer Land Trust to see about placing a memorial bench at Aeolia Preserve. Her son Ben and his wife Shelley, who are Placer Land Trust members, live nearby and the family had enjoyed many walks there together when they came to visit.

Larry was a deeply compassionate man whose sense of adventure was equaled only by his sense of humor. Family vacations were full of hiking, board games, and, whenever possible, his favorite dessert: banana cream pie. Becky and her daughter, Meagan worked together with Kara at Placer Land Trust to find just the right words to convey Larry's spirit on a plaque.

After the bench was installed in the fall, Becky's family (which includes children Ben, Eric and Meagan, their spouses and six grandkids) gathered during the holidays to see the bench for the first time. Mist was hanging in the valley and the sun was shining as they looked out over the beautiful view.

Later, around the table, Ben shared that some of his friends had recently told him about discovering a new bench along the trail they regularly hiked. They mentioned the meaningful inscription and how it was placed in such a beautiful spot. Ben hadn't told his friends about the bench yet, and when they finished their story, he teared up a little and said with a smile, "That's my Dad's bench!"

The Moore family hopes the bench will be loved and enjoyed for years to come, and that the folks who pause and sit there will think of Larry and smile (with or without banana cream pie).

Recent Grants

The Land Trust Alliance awarded Placer Land Trust a \$12,500 grant to work with the Koy'o Land Conservancy, a nonprofit affiliated with the Colfax-Todds Valley Consolidated Tribe. This grant will enable us to contract one or more cultural resource advisors from the Conservancy in 2024 to lead Cultural Resource Identification and Stewardship workshops and perform cultural site assessments on conservation lands in Placer County.

We recently received two grants for general operating support: \$20,000 from the Nathan Cummings Foundation and \$15,000 from the Clif Bar Family Foundation. These funds will help us explore new conservation projects, steward the lands already in our care, and help us share opportunities to enjoy land with the public.

We were awarded \$2,500 from the Athens Renewable Energy community giving program to be used toward the purchase of e-bikes. These bikes will be used by our stewardship team to make getting around our preserves more efficient.

We also received a \$20,000 grant from the Kelly Foundation to help with a future conservation project. We thank them for their dedication "to support conservation, awareness and sustainable management of California's environment, wildlife, natural habitat, open space, wetlands, watersheds, forests and trees, for both natural and recreational uses".
