## **Three Cheers for Our Volunteers!**

Land conservation is a full-time job, and then some – that's why we are so grateful for the volunteers who help us leverage our resources and accomplish so much! We recently held our annual VolunCHEERS! Picnic and Awards to show our appreciation for all who support Placer Land Trust through preserve stewardship, trail maintenance, help at events, leading outings as docents, and more.

In 2023, we had an impressive 187 active volunteers, who together contributed 3,420 volunteer hours. And it all translated into greater public engagement, offering opportunities to more people in a variety of ways to create meaningful connections to the land and each other.

Our Land Steward of the Year, Bryan Wright, was recognized for his leadership and vision as head of our Trail Stewards crew – a group that he helped develop to meet the growing need for trail work. With deep experience in trail layout, construction, and maintenance, Bryan has helped improve our trail networks at the Big Hill, Harvego, and Canyon View Preserves in countless ways.

Our **Volunteer of the Year, Cathy Scott,** was recognized for her incredible dedication and can-do attitude! She is an active member of the preserve steward, trail steward, and chainsaw teams-and comes to every other land-based opportunity she can, including Broom Battles, oak regeneration workdays, preserve clean-up days, even Adopt-a-Highway trash pickups. Her two trail horses are volunteers, too – she brings them to help out with our equestrian docent program as well as the Trail Patrol in the Tahoe National Forest.

## **Recent Grants**

We recently received a grant from Placer Community Foundation to help us improve technological aspects of our work and deliver our mission in the most efficient and meaningful way possible. These funds will help us make web-based communication upgrades, especially accessibility enhancements; expand trail descriptions on our website for public preserves, including accessibility information; add more community-science monitoring stations on our public lands; improve our hybrid meeting technology; and launch a robust volunteer management system. Investing in these technological improvements will allow us to continue to expand the number and diversity of community members enjoying the many benefits of pr<mark>ote</mark>cted land. Thanks to Placer Community Foundation for helping us work smarter!

We have also received a \$20,000 grant from the George W. Bauer Family Foundation to help build trail connections between our Big Hill Preserve and Placer County's Hidden Falls Regional Park. Over the last 14 years, we have built and maintained trails at Big Hill Preserve in order to provide new recreational opportunities, and to eventually connect our trails with those at Placer County's Hidden Falls Regional Park. With the opening of the park expansion expected to take place in the next year or so, we are stepping up our trail construction, fuel load management, and protection of special natural and cultural features within the trail corridors. We are working hard to ensure that this new recreation access will be inclusive and enjoyable for all.

With these funds from the Bauer Foundation, our funding gap is closing, but we still need additional funding to complete our work to open Big Hill Preserve to the public in 2025.
